HAYWOOD COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTER GRADUATION

The Mission Team asks you to consider sponsoring a graduate from Haywood Community Learning Center (HCLC).

Graduation is June 6 and will take place at Haywood Community College.

The cost of a full sponsorship is \$55 per student, which includes the cap, gown, tassel, diploma and diploma cover. However, any amount you care to donate will be greatly appreciated! In the memo portion of your check, please indicate "HCLC graduation," or if giving online, scroll down to Special Donations and then click on HCLC graduation.

The deadline for donating is Sunday, May 26.

Some background information from Nancy Medford, HCLC's Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Case Manager/Assistant Director:

The Haywood Community Learning Center was founded in 2009 to help curb Haywood County's rising high school drop-out rates. Their program operates Tuesday through Thursday from 9:30 - 2:00. The students use an online platform called Edgenuity but are still required to come in person all three days to receive assistance and a sense of community.

They currently have 37 students who are scheduled to graduate this year - as long as they stay on track (19 boys, 16 girls and 2 non-binary). There are a few more students who might be able to finish the graduation requirements by the May 16th deadline.

Some of the reasons students are at HCLC rather than their home schools are attendance, lack of engagement, lack of sufficient credits, not successful in the traditional setting, unplanned teen pregnancy, justice involvement, mental and physical health, needing to work full time to provide for their families, young mothers/fathers, and students who are referred to HCLC by their homeschool who think HCLC would be a better environment for them. As of right now, out of their 37 potential graduates, 10 students plan on enrolling at a community college, and 13 plan to seek workforce certifications. There are a total of 75 students who are enrolled at HCLC and they span grades 9-12 with a small fifth-year cohort. To be enrolled at HCLC students must be between the ages of 16 and 21. There are a total of 9 staff members who work at HCLC - 4 part time teachers who are licensed in each of the four content areas (math, English, social studies and science), one Exceptional Children teacher and Job Coach that works with Occupational Course of Study students, and three office staff members (the director, the receptionist/bookkeeper and the assistant director).

We will be providing lunch for the graduates following their graduation rehearsal at Haywood Community College on Thursday, June 6.

Because the lunch will take place at HCC, it will be simple.

Presbyterian Women Spring Gathering April 20th @ Montreat



SESSION MEETING April 8, 2024

Pastor Holly called the meeting to order and opened with prayer at 1:00 p.m. in the Upper Room. Attending were Stan Briggs, Melonie Gross, Mike McKinney, Ron Tingle and Pastor Holly Davis. Voting online: Rick Croskery, Laura Janson, Wes Lee and Pat Parker.

For informational purposes and church records:

Pastor Holly led the elders in an opening prayer and a devotional discussion of the spiritual roles of elders and of the Session, as presented in JoAnn Gray's book Spiritual Leadership. Discussion focused on serving God out of gratitude, not duty. Stan brought congregational prayer needs from the Board of Deacons and the elders prayed together. Clerk Ron Tingle declared a quorum. The agenda was approved, as were the Minutes, as amended.

Finance chair Mike McKinney presented financials through March 31st. March income was \$31,521 with expenses of \$27,304, for a monthly net income of \$4,217. This puts us right back on target with our year-to-date budget. In March we were able to pay \$4,000 extra towards principal on the Elevator & Parking Project bank loan. This is in addition to the scheduled monthly payment of \$2,677. After discussion of other details, Mike's report was approved.

Session discussed Kathi Armstrong's need to step down from the newsletter editorship after the May issue. Using Sunday announcements and written notices, the elders will spread the word regarding the immediate need for replacement. Kathi's shoes will be hard to fill, as the newsletter was so well received during her years at the helm.

There will also be a vacancy at the Treasurer's position, as Nancy Thompson will be stepping down December 31st. Session discussed its methodology for filling the vacancy, whether to hire someone or to consider a volunteer from the congregation. In either case, recruitment should begin soon to allow for a turnover/learning period for the candidate.

Melonie Gross proposed that our church play a larger role, beyond serving lunch once a month, in support of the students at Haywood Community Learning Center. One idea is financial support for the graduation ceremony. Some students find it difficult to afford the \$55 cost of cap & gown, diploma and its cover. If we offer support, the funds would be needed by May 25th. Mission Team could place an appeal for sponsorship in an April worship bulletin. Melonie also suggested we provide a cold luncheon for the graduating students on June 6th between their dress rehearsal and graduation. Mission Team will gladly take this on. Finally, Melonie suggested we provide a red rose to each graduate, purchasing four dozen roses from Worship Team's floral fund. Session concurred and will move forward on this issue. After review of upcoming events, Session adjourned. Pastor Holly led the group in a closing prayer.



It was a juggling act on top of theater, but the extra money helped. At the beginning of her senior year, Trudy founded a chapter of the International Thespian Society at her high school and was appointed president. She worked closely with the theater director and other student officers to run the drama department and organize events to bring the community together. Through this experience, Trudy got to improve her organizational and communication skills. She also started a mentor program to help with the transition for incoming freshmen. Trudy emerged as a leader in the drama department, not only running the Thespian Society, but also starring as the leading woman in her school's Spring musical. Trudy was also a leader of her school's acapella group, arranging and performing songs for audiences. By the end of her senior year, and into the summer, she was appointed head lifeguard at the pool she's been working at, scheduling 40+ guards and ensuring duties are performed around the pool deck.

Trudy started her college search during the spring of her junior year and had all her applications in by September. Through research, she discovered a liberal arts education is what she wanted.
